## **Private Isaac Norval Baker**

Company F – 18<sup>th</sup> Virginia Cavalry

Norval was born October 8, 1844 in Hampshire County, Virginia. He was the son of Henry H. and Maria Ann Bywaters Baker.

He enlisted as a private on October 8, 1862.

He is shown present on the muster report of 2-28-1863. On July 4<sup>th</sup> as the cavalry was escorting the train of wounded southward after Gettysburg Norval wrote, ". . . it rained all night, one thunder storm after another. The rain fell in sheets and vivid flashes of lightning . . . the roar of the waters and heavy bursting thunder, the cries of the wounded and dying soldiers made it awful."

On July 18<sup>th</sup> Company F was a mile south of the Potomac River. The campaign in Pennsylvania had badly abused their horses. Norval noted, "Our horses backs were raw with ulcers one and two inches deep and full of maggots. The green flies had put up a big job on us, our blankets were full of maggots and rotten, our saddles had from a pint to a quart of maggots in them and we had to run them out with hot water and soap and it [will be] months before the horses backs [are] cured."

Records show Norval's parole being issued on April 22, 1865 and he recorded this in his diary, ". . . we decided to go in together and get our paroles. We met at Back Creek Tollgate & footed it to Winchester . . . we marched in by twos . . . ordered to halt . . . an officer came up to us & said, "Well, gentlemen & soldiers, we are glad to meet you in this way, much nicer than we have been meeting you the last four years.""

The parole papers indicated Norval was 5' 7", had hazel eyes, brown hair and a light complexion.

Postwar Norval was an Herb Doctor in Forestville, Virginia and later in Frederick County. He married Lucy Pauline Baker on February 6, 1879. She was born 2-28-1858 and will die 9-24-1928.

Norval died December 6, 1924 just a couple of months past his 80<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Private Isaac Norval Baker rests in the Woodlawn Cemetery in Frederick Cty., Virginia. Lucy passed 4 years later and their names, birth and death dates are on the same stone.
